Ballot questions referred by the general assembly or any political subdivision are listed by letter, and ballot questions initiated by the people are listed numerically. A ballot question listed as an "amendment" proposes a change to the Colorado constitution, and a ballot question listed as a "proposition" proposes a change to the Colorado Revised Statutes. Proposition EE (STATUTORY)

SHALL STATE TAXES BE INCREASED BY \$294,000,000 ANNUALLY BY IMPOSING A TAX ON NICOTINE LIQUIDS USED IN E-CIGARETTES AND OTHER VAPING PRODUCTS THAT IS EQUAL TO THE TOTAL STATE TAX ON TOBACCO PRODUCTS WHEN FULLY PHASED IN, INCREMENTALLY INCREASING THE TOBACCO PRODUCTS TAX BY UP TO 22% OF THE MANUFACTURER'S LIST PRICE, INCREMENTALLY INCREASING THE CIGARETTE TAX BY UP TO 9 CENTS PER CIGARETTE, EXPANDING THE EXISTING CIGARETTE AND TOBACCO TAXES TO APPLY TO SALES TO CONSUMERS FROM OUTSIDE OF THE STATE ESTABLISHING A MINIMUM TAX FOR MOIST SNUFF TOBACCO PRODUCTS, CREATING AN INVENTORY TAX THAT APPLIES FOR FUTURE CIGARETTE TAX INCREASES, AND INITIALLY USING THE TAX REVENUE PRIMARILY FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL FUNDING TO HELP OFFSET REVENUE THAT HAS BEEN LOST AS A RESULT OF THE ECONOMIC MPACTS RELATED TO COVID-19 AND THEN FOR PROGRAMS THAT REDUCE THE USE OF TOBACCO AND NICOTINE PRODUCTS, ENHANCE THE VOLUNTARY COLORADO PRESCHOOL PROGRAM AND MAKE IT WIDELY AVAILABLE FOR FREE. AND MAINTAIN THE FUNDING FOR PROGRAMS THAT CURRENTLY RECEIVE REVENUE FROM TOBACCO TAXES, WITH THE STATE KEEPING AND SPENDING ALL OF THE NEW TAX REVENUE AS A VOTER-APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE?

Town of Nucla Ballot Issue 2B:

SHALL THE TOWN OF NUCLA TAXES BE INCREASED \$5,000 FOR THE FIRST FULL FISCAL YEAR (2021) AND ANNUALLY THEREAFTER BY SUCH AMOUNTS AS MAY BE GENERATED FROM THE LEVY OF A LODGING OCCUPATION TAX AT THE RATE OF \$2.00 PER NIGHT PER OCCUPIED LODGING ROOM PAID FOR BY THE LEASING, RENTAL OR FURNISHING OF ANY SHORT TERM (LESS THAN 30 CONSECUTIVE DAYS) LODGING SERVICES IN THE TOWN, FOR THE PURPOSE OF GENERATING FUNDS TO PROMOTE TOURISM ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND COMMUNITY BEAUTIFICATION WITHIN THE TOWN; AND SHALL THE FUNDS COLLECTED FROM SUCH TAX BE HELD IN A FUND SEPARATE FROM THE TOWN'S GENERAL FUND AND USED EXCLUSIVELY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROMOTING TOURISM, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND COMMUNITY BEAUTIFICATION; AND SHALL AN ADVISORY BOARD BE ESTABLISHED, WHICH MEMBERS SHALL BE APPOINTED BY THE TOWN BOARD OF TRUSTEES, TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE TRUSTEES CONCERNING THE SPECIFIC USE OF THE LODGING OCCUPATION TAX REVENUES CONSISTENT WITH THE FOREGOING PURPOSES; AND SHALL THE TOWN BE AUTHORIZED TO COLLECT, RETAIN AND SPEND SUCH LODGING OCCUPATION TAX REVENUES EACH YEAR. INCLUDING INVESTMENT EARNINGS AND INTEREST ON SUCH REVENUES, AS A VOTER APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE UNDER ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION OR ANY OTHER LAW?

Shall there be a change to the Colorado Revised Statutes concerning the creation of a paid family and medical leave program in Colorado, and, in connection therewith, authorizing paid family and medical leave for a covered employee who has a serious health condition, is caring for a new child or for a family member with a serious health condition, or has a need for leave related to a family member's military deployment or for safe leave; establishing a maximum of 12 weeks of family and medical leave, with an additional 4 weeks for pregnancy or childbirth complications, with a cap on the weekly benefit amount; requiring job protection for and prohibiting retaliation against an employee who takes paid family and medical leave; allowing a local government to opt out of the program; permitting employees of such a local government and self-employed individuals to participate in the program; exempting employers who offer an approved private paid family and medical leave plan; to pay for the program, requiring a premium of 0.9% of each employee's wages, up to a cap, through December 31, 2024, and as set thereafter, up to 1.2% of each employee's wages, by the director of the division of family and medical leave insurance; authorizing an employer to deduct up to 50% of the premium amount from an employee's wages and requiring the employer to pay the remainder of the premium, with an exemption for employers with fewer than 10 employees; creating the division of family and medical leave insurance as an enterprise within the department of labor and employment to administer the program; and establishing an enforcement and appeals process for retaliation and denied claims?
